What is an Earmark?

- One-time grant funding for local community projects
- Only nonprofit entities and units of local government are eligible
- Funding comes from existing federal grant program authorities

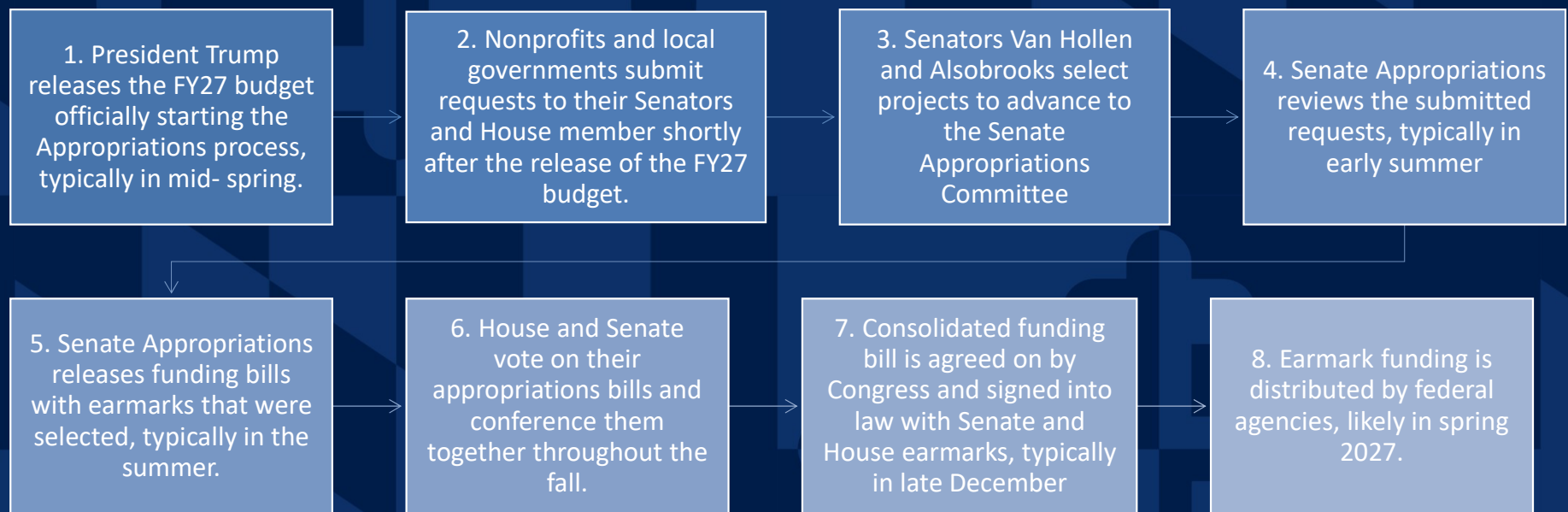
- Limits per committee on number of requests per office
- Some accounts differ from House
- 2 Letters of support required by our offices

House

- 15 requests per office
- Some accounts differ from Senate
- Two letters of support required for each request by committee

Note that deadlines may be different for House and Senate

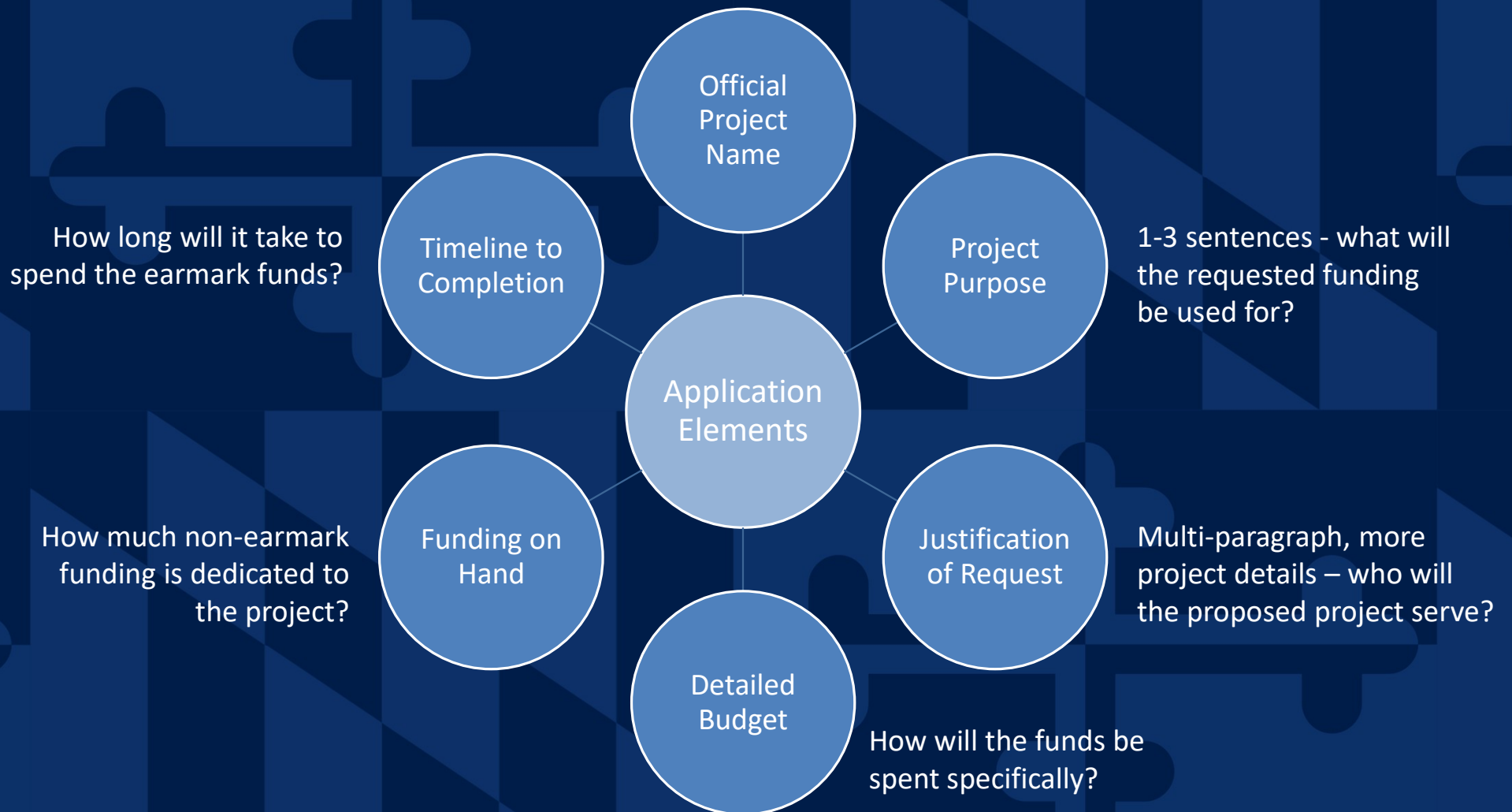

Tips for a Strong Application

Reach out to both your Senate and House Delegation members to maximize our ability to support you

If seeking letters of support from state legislators, start early to avoid the height of the General Assembly session

Explain clearly how your project advances equity and addresses unmet community needs

If requesting multiple projects, provide a ranked priority list

Communicate with delegation staff throughout process, including project idea development

Include any information on the scalability of your project, especially for large requests

If relevant, consider inviting field staff to visit your project to learn more about your needs

Explain how your project will become self-sustaining without the need for further earmark funding

Coordinating with State Agencies



For accounts with state agency approval requirements, start outreach early



Before applying for earmark funds, discuss with the relevant state agency the cost-share requirements and possible administrative costs associated with your proposed project.



Transportation projects that are not in the CTP or STIP require a letter from MDOT confirming that, should your project be funded, MDOT will amend the STIP to include your project.

Water infrastructure projects will have to be reviewed by MDE and Emergency Operations Center projects will have to be reviewed by MDEM.

Sample Project & Application:

Project Purpose

Funds will support construction of a new pedestrian bridge to connect the east and west sides of the Shaw neighborhood in Baltimore City. Several old train tracks divide the community and create an access barrier to community facilities on each side of the tracks.

Justification of Request

This funding would enable construction of a pedestrian bridge to better connect the east and west sides of the community. New rowhomes and businesses have been built on both sides of the train tracks but are physically separated. The pedestrian bridge will allow for more access to the benefits of both communities. The median household income in this area is \$34,041, compared to the City median of \$52,318. A lack of investment in the area is attributed to the difficulty of community members and visitors to reach businesses and community facilities on both sides of the tracks.
